




	<p>Colorado Blue Spruce: A popular tree that grows to 100 ft with hardy and stiff blue-green needles that are 1-inch in length. Does well in soils of average moisture but must be well drained, drought tolerant, full sun.</p> <p>Tree Use: Christmas tree, wildlife, windbreak, timber.</p>
	<p>Norway Spruce: A fast-growing tree, reaching 40-60 ft. It has branchlets that typically hang downward and produce 1-inch dark green needles. Does well in various soils, drought tolerant, full sun.</p> <p>Tree Use: Christmas tree, wildlife, windbreak, timber.</p>
	<p>Concolor Fir: Grows to a height of 30-50 ft with a spread of 20 ft. Grows best in well-drained, sandy, loamy, well-drained soils, and has moderate drought tolerance. Prefers full sun to partial shade.</p> <p>Tree Use: Christmas tree, wildlife, and windbreak.</p>
	<p>Eastern White Pine: Can reach 80-120 ft in height. Very hardy. Clustered soft blue-green needles, ideal windbreak. Prefers moist, well-drained soil, full sun or partial shade.</p> <p>Tree Use: Christmas tree, erosion control, wildlife, timber.</p>
	<p>White Spruce: At maturity can reach heights of 40-60 ft. Can withstand nearly all weather and soil conditions.</p> <p>Tree Use: Christmas trees, habitat/wildlife, windbreak, streambank, timber.</p>
	<p>Balsam Fir: Another popular tree that can reach heights of 45-75 ft. at maturity. It prefers acidic, moist soils with full sun and partial shade.</p> <p>Tree Use: Christmas tree, windbreak, wildlife, timber.</p>
	<p>Arborvitae: Most common uses are hedges & ornamentals. Can reach 30-50 ft. in height. A hardy tree that can do well in various soils, but loamy moist soils are best.</p> <p>Tree Use: Wildlife, windbreak.</p>
	<p>Buttonbush: A multi-stemmed shrub which grows to 6-12 ft. Small flowers grow in dense, spherical clusters with a fringe of pistils. Suitable to wet soils that are fairly neutral in pH. Attractive to pollinators, unpalatable to livestock and deer.</p> <p>Shrub Use: Ornamental, pollinators.</p>
	<p>Lilac: Will reach heights of 15 ft with a dense spread of 6-10 ft. Lavender colored blooms arrive in late spring.</p> <p>Tree Use: Wildlife, ornamental.</p>
	<p>Red Oak: A fast growing tree reaching 60-75 ft in height and a 45 ft spread. Tolerant of pollution and soil compaction. Prefers acidic, moist, well-drained soils, but has some drought tolerance. Full sun is ideal.</p> <p>Tree Use: Wildlife, timber.</p>
	<p>Sugar Maple: Can grow to be 60-75 ft tall. Used in maple syrup production. A landscape standout with orange/red leaves in fall. Tolerates shade, likes well-drained, moderately moist soil.</p> <p>Tree Use: Wildlife, timber, and maple syrup.</p>

	<p>Northern Catalpa: Produces white, showy flowers and giant heart-shaped leaves as well as bean-like seed pods. Reaching heights of 40-60 ft at maturity with a 20-40 ft spread. It prefers full sun and partial shade and will tolerate most soil types and moisture conditions.</p> <p>Tree Use: Wildlife, timber.</p>
	<p>Tulip Poplar: A fast-growing tree, reaching 70-90 ft at maturity with a 40 ft spread. Grows well in acidic, loamy/sandy/clay soils that are well-drained. Full sun is ideal. Blooms in May-June.</p> <p>Tree Use: Food for many forms of wildlife, timber.</p>
	<p>Eastern Redbud: Grows to 20-30 ft in height with a 30 ft spread. Produces rosy pink flowers in early spring. It prefers full sun and partial shade in windy areas with well-drained soils.</p> <p>Tree Use: Ornamental, wildlife, pollinators.</p>
	<p>Chester Blackberry: A winter hardy, thornless cultivar. Berries are firm and color does not fade in sunny weather. Vine is resistant to cane blight. Berries ripen mid-August in northern US. Hardiness zones 5b-9b.</p>
	<p>Jaclyn Raspberry: Mid-summer ripening. Fruits are firm and conical with sweet flavors. Highly resistant to common insect and fungal diseases. Hardiness zones 3-8.</p>
	<p>Legacy Blueberry: A high-bush type cultivar, growing mostly upright to 6 ft at maturity. Fruit is medium sized (approx. 75 berries per cup). Plants are resistant to stem canker as well as leaf, root, and fungal diseases. Hardiness zones 5-8</p>
	<p>Bonus Blueberry: A high-bush type cultivar, growing mostly upright to 6 ft at maturity. Fruit size is extra large (100 berries per pound). Resistant to many blueberry fungal diseases. Hardiness zones 4-7.</p>
	<p>Wealthy Apple: An early season picker with a sweet-tart flavor with notes of honey and raspberry. The fruit is crisp, yellow/green with a red blush. Great for fresh eating and does well in baking. Hardiness zones 4-8.</p>
	<p>Stripe Fuji Apple: Ripens mid-October. A sweet variety originating from Japan. Great for fresh eating and stores well. Need lots of sunshine to ripen properly. Hardiness zones 4-8.</p>
	<p>Royal Empire Apple: A cross of Red Delicious and McIntosh. Ripens early October (approx. 2 wks after McIntosh). Good for fresh eating, cider, sauce, cooking, and freezing. Hardiness zones 4-8.</p>
